Trotzky Sees Menace In Speech of Briand

MOSCOW, Dec. 22 (By The Associated Press).—Leon Trotzky, the Bolshevik Minister of War, in an address to-day to the commanding officers of the army in session in Moscow, warned them that the alleged recent predictions of M. Briand, the French Premier, at the Washington conference that Soviet Russia was planning for a spring campaign were intended to screen the plans of the Entente for aggression against Russia. Therefore he cautioned the officers to be ready. He said the Russian military schools must be thoroughly awake to the situation.

Officials Face Jail as Budget Crisis Grows

Appellate Court Orders Hylan and the Estimate Board to Restore Three Million Cut in Pensions Must Act Before Dec. 26

Further legal complications in regard to the 1922 budget, which threaten to invalidate the budget as a whole in its present form, possibly, put the Mayor and other members of the Board of Estimate in jail for contempt of court, arose yesterday. Under the law the budget must be signed and approved by the Mayor, the Comptroller and the City Clerk on or before December 25. In the absence of Comptroller Charles L. Craig on a hunting trip Deputy Comptroller Henry Smith will be called upon to sign as acting Comptroller.

Two Days Left for Work

As there are only two more days left before the budget must be finally passed, the city officials will have to work fast to conform to the legal requirements. The Finance Department admitted last night that the city had never confronted a more serious financial problem. The complications began in earnest yesterday when the Mayor, the Comptroller and other members of the Board of Estimate were served with copies of the recent order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court directing the city officials to restore to the 1922 budget some \$2,000,000 of city department pension funds which, it was alleged, were illegally deducted in order to comply with the Mayor's constitutional tax limit. A similar order was obtained originally from Justice Mallon in the Supreme Court by Bernard Deutch, counsel for the United Real Estate Builders' Association. An appeal from this order was taken by the city to the Appellate Division, which recently affirmed the order of the lower court.
