Dr. Sullivan Quits All Souls' Church To Be Missionary

Unitarian Predicts at Present Rate of Decline in 30 Years New York Population Will Be 10 Per Cent Protestant

Dr. William L. Sullivan resigned his pastorate at All Souls Unitarian Church, Fourth Avenue and Twentieth Street, yesterday, to accept the invitation of the Unitarian Laymen's League to become a missionary to Unitarian churches of the United States and Canada. His ministry, which began in 1914, will end as soon as All Souls selects his successor.

In a letter to members of All Souls parish, Dr. Sullivan predicts that unless the present decline in church membership in Greater New York in thirty years will be not more than 10 per cent of the population, and that the Borough of the Bronx will, in ten years, have a smaller proportionate membership in Protestant churches than the Island of Ceylon.

A statement signed by Charles H. Strong, 27 Cedar Street, president of the Unitarian Laymen's League, says in part: "In January and November, 1920, the Unitarian Laymen's League organized and financed two large groups of leading and representative Unitarian ministers, sending them on the continent to make more widely known a liberal faith and to encourage its adherents in isolated sections. A series of projected meetings was provided in the two Unitarian churches in St. Louis in November, 1921. The results were abundant."

The League now announces that Dr. William L. Sullivan has accepted its invitation to devote his entire time henceforth to leadership in similar series of meetings in different parts of the United States and Canada.

\$100,000 Mine Fire Blazes Over Cache of Dynamite

CRANSTON, R. I., Jan. 8.—Fire of unknown origin swept through the buildings of the Cranston coal mines here tonight, raising the entire group of superstructures above the mine shaft and causing a loss that may pass \$100,000. Although the burning buildings at the height of the fire constituted a rearward furnace, discharging the mouth of the shaft, flames did not communicate with a large cache of dynamite stored 300 feet below the surface. The immense quantity of explosive contributed to the hazard of igniting the fire.
