# U. S. Gains Near Billion in 8 Yrs. European Trade

### Total Business for 1921 Is \$775,000,000 More Than 1913, Even With Higher Value of Dollar

### Britain Is Best Customer Deals With Latin-America Increase Over 100 Per Cent Since Pre-War Period

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—American trade with European countries was increasing by \$775,000,000 in 1921 than during the last pre-war year, 1913, according to an estimate based on eleven months' statistics made public to-night by the Commerce Department.

Exports to Europe during the last year were estimated at \$2,380,000,000, as against \$1,500,000,000 in 1913, while imports for 1921 were placed at \$760,000,000, compared with \$865,000,000 in 1913.

Great Britain, the department said, was this country's best customer in the world, while Germany has risen to second place in Europe as a consumer of American goods.

Trade between the United States and Latin America increased 100 per cent in value during 1921, as compared with 1913. During 1921 the department estimated trade between all the countries of Latin America and the United States amounted to \$1,404,000,000, as against a total of \$730,000,000 in 1913.

Exports to Latin America for 1921 were estimated at \$1,100,000,000, against \$570,000,000 in 1913, while imports from Latin America were placed at \$304,000,000, as against \$150,000,000 in 1913.

# Ford Plans 'Rural City' Greater Than Detroit at Muscle Shoals

### Hopes to Develop Power Center and Give It Back to People Free Without Cent of Profit as Crowning Achievement of Career

DETROIT, Jan. 11 (By The Associated Press).—If Henry Ford obtains possession of the Muscle Shoals project in Alabama he will take immediate steps to make that part of the South one of the industrial centers of the country.

Mr. Ford expects to leave here about noon to-morrow for Washington to confer with Secretary Weeks regarding his proposal to lease the Alabama plant.

Mr. Ford's proposal includes the building of a city seventy-five miles long in the Muscle Shoals region. It would be made up of a number of large towns or small cities. This is in line with the manufacturer's view that men and their families should live in small communities where benefits of rural or near-rural life would not be entirely lost.
