

Zita Forced to Hurry Back to Place of Exile

Former Empress Is Expelled From Switzerland and Denied Permission to Meet Any One in France

Plot for Throne Mentioned

Children Going to Madeira With Her; She Will Be Guest of King Alfonso

French war crosses. Her brothers insist that the charges of a conspiracy to regain the Hungarian throne are ridiculous, especially in view of her children.

Except for the reunion with her brother at Bordeaux, Zita will not be among friends until she crosses the Spanish border where the King will claim her as a guest with all the pomp due erstwhile royalty. After a rest in Madrid, the former empress will sail from Lisbon for Funchal.

According to reports from the island of exile, Charles is not having a very happy time of it. He is "strapped," being forced to pay \$120 a week for board and room. His expenses are supposed to be paid by Czechoslovakia, Jugoslavia and Rumania, with help from Austria and Hungary later, but the required contributions have not always been forthcoming.

Mrs. Stone was taken to the warden's office for examination and Mrs. Slavin returned to the six women she had abandoned on the first tier. Buddy appeared satisfied with the situation and resumed his nap in front of the range.

Mrs. Slavin found the six women precisely where she had left them. Not one had stirred from her tracks since the flight of her leader. After taking them to their cells Mrs. Slavin went to the warden's office.

Heflin Again Opposes Reserve Bank Building

Dr. O. S. Lowley, who lives at the Hotel Wyoming, Seventh Avenue and Fifty-fifth Street, made public yesterday a letter from Mrs. William F. Doherty, who said she was returning to this country to try to avenge the death of her husband, an American civil engineer, who was killed by followers of Ghandi in a riot at Byculla during the visit of the Prince of Wales.

He was attacked by 500 natives, Mrs. Doherty said, and died defending himself. She held Ghandi responsible for her husband's death, although he had called on her, she said, to express his regret.

"Had I a gun," she added, "I would have killed him. England is so afraid she will appear weak if she arrests this fellow."

The evening before her husband was killed, she said both of them had attended a reception in honor of the Prince of Wales. She had few kind words for British officialdom, however, expressing the belief that Ghandi should have been dealt with more firmly.

Declares "Marble Temple" in New York Wrings \$20,000,000 From South and West

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—In a speech in the Senate today, while the Treasury

"I Insist That the President Ought to Call on the Federal Reserve Board to Stop This Project," Said Senator Heflin

"Orders have gone out suspending construction of public buildings elsewhere. Why not stop this and save the taxpayers \$20,000,000?"

The Senator also attacked the Federal Reserve Board and said the board ought to be ousted from office.

"I don't blame the Wall Street crowd," he said, "for putting on the back those that enable them to put money in their purse."

When Men Die

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Zita pleaded to be allowed to interrupt the trip long enough to go to Paris to see her two brothers, the Princes Sixtus and Xaier, of Bourbon Parma, as well as to purchase a layette for the baby to be born in March. It was also her purpose to obtain financial aid from her brothers. But the French government ignored these pleas and with the same sternness with which the Berne government drove her from Switzerland, taking her away from the son who has been ill there with appendicitis.

France's Attitude Surprising

It is understood that Czechoslovakia and Jugoslavia brought pressure to bear on France to prevent her stopping in this country, as those states insist that Zita is plotting a new revolution to regain the Hungarian throne. They say she is hatching a conspiracy in which her visit to Switzerland and France has played an important part.

Zita left Charles at Funchal a fortnight ago and went to Switzerland with permission to pass some time with her ill son. Yesterday the Swiss government notified her that she must be prepared to leave that country today and that she would be accompanied by Swiss officials as far as the frontier at Basle.

According to information received by Prince Sixtus of his sister's predicament, she is taking six of her children with her, leaving only the ill one in Switzerland. Prince Sixtus is going to Bordeaux Sunday to meet Zita and provide her with money enough to complete her journey back to exile.

According to Prince Sixtus, Zita has been held virtually incommunicado since her arrival in Switzerland. All the time she has been guarded closely, and she has not been allowed to talk to friends.

Charles Lacked Money
