Brooklyn Due in Sunny South Two Days Before Other Teams

Former Star Southpaw Will Help Wilbert Robinson With Rookie Squad; Signings; Joe Dugan Comes to Terms With Red Sox

Two or three National League clubs may finish higher than our Dodgers in the final reckoning next October, but none of them is going to beat the Flatbush Squire's young men away from the barrier, Uncle Wilbert Robinson yesterday bulletined orders for mobilization that will land his merry men in the Jacksonville, Fla., training camp on Sunday February 26. Training will be inaugurated the following morning, at least two days previous to any other major league spring splash.

Yale-Harvard Tennis Team to Visit England


The Professional Side
