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Scorn of Law Held Ruining Local Juries

Judges Talley and Mancuso Dismiss 30 Panel Members Who Refuse to Believe Police Evidence

Three times last week a jury was reprimanded and excused from further service in General Sessions for a verdict of acquittal in the face of police testimony which the judges regarded as convincing. The third instance came to light yesterday. It took place Friday. As in the other two cases, the jurors said they did not believe the policemen.

"Recent developments," said Judge Talley, "are due, I think, to something comparable with the spirit of lawlessness and revolt against authority and government that has manifested itself among criminals in crime outbreaks and is indicated among persons not criminals but who are prone to supporting organized government by violent means."
