Master Art Shown By French Painters Of Three Schools

American Galleries to Sell Collection of 61 Good Examples; Impressionists Led by Monet and Degas

Sixty-one paintings by masters of the Impressionist, Barbizon and the American schools constitute the latest important sale to be announced by the American Art Galleries. They were hung for exhibition at the galleries yesterday and will be offered at the ballroom of the Plaza Hotel next Thursday evening.

The collection is signalized by its worthy representation of significant Frenchmen. The Impressionists, represented by Monet, Degas, Renoir, Sisley and Pissarro, together with Courbet, hold the center of attention.

Jacques, Diaz, Ziem, Corot, Manet and others contribute to the ensemble. The French phase of the collection is made up by the property of Messrs. Winkel and Magnusson, of Copenhagen, while several owners are responsible for the offerings of the American school. These include two Innesses, a Carlson, a Homer Martin, a Wyant, a Weir and several examples by Bruce Crane and Couss.

Three of the four works of Courbet are uniformly large and representative of the richest qualities of the painter. They are the beautiful green hillside and stream composition, "The Dam," a charming winter subject comprising a lake, bridge and small houses at the base of a mountain range, and the quaintly realistic "Valley Mill at Ormains."

Monet's "Belle Isle" Vivid

Of the Monets, "Belle Isle" a sunlit effect on a choppy coastal sea broken by perpendicular crags, is the most vivid. It reveals the artist at work in pure color, seeking to fathom the strong play of light on the turbulent surface of the water. His "Flowing Meadows" and "Giverny" are lovely summer landscapes in a brighter, more tender vein. An opalescent harmony of light and color radiates from another rich example, "The Path Through the Woods," and there, in the soft, chalk cliffs near Fecamp from the Viau collection, Paris.

The contributions of Sisley are three river scenes with lumbering barges, in each case the center of soft light and distant low landscapes of buildings and tall trees. These, in characteristic nervous, masterfully composed, are set off by a showy, more delicate "Sunny Afternoon," in brighter tones.

Though in reality little more than sketches, the Degas ballet composition and Manet's "The Woman with the Hat" are excellent examples of technique and draftsmanship. There is, in this school, the warm light painting of "The Harvest" and a brilliantly imitative, full of air and meadow composition, "Moss Garden," both by Pissarro.

Felix Ziem Represented

Felix Ziem is represented by several gay scenes of Venice and the Orient, and his views of Constantinople and the famous racecourse are slightly of his beaten track. An especially fine Corot is among the lot, it being the "Hamlet" landscape and figure composition of an expansive mountain range and "Britany Landscape" are two others attributed to him.

Noteworthy among the American specimens are Inness's "Roman Campagna" and "The Bay of Naples," and the marine vista, "Tarpun Springs," Bogart's "Cloudy Day" and Homer Maguire's "Hudson River Landscape."
