

Banker Held With Dancer Aboard Liner

Dutch Financier, Arriving on Ryndam, Detained by Immigration Authorities; Paid for Girl's Ticket To Visit Speyer. He Says "Lupo the Wolf" Said to Have Been Pardoned by Harding, to Get a Hearing

Unusual activity was displayed yesterday by the immigration boarding officers in holding up saloon passengers on the Dutch liner Ryndam. Several passengers were detained for further examination before boards of special inquiry.

The most important detention was that of H. Teixeira de Mattos, a banker of Holland, well known in the financial district here, who came, he said, on a visit to James Speyer. He was a passenger on the Holland-America liner Ryndam, from Rotterdam.

The cause of the banker's detention was withheld by immigration officials. It was said that in questioning the banker, it was revealed that he had paid her fare to visit the banker on the Atlantic.

It is said that De Mattos did not deny having paid for the young woman's transportation, his attention being fixed on the fact that she was journeying to America like himself for a visit to see nothing wrong in making her a gift of a trans-Atlantic ticket. Miss Collins and De Mattos were detained aboard ship and will be taken to Ellis Island today.

"Lupo the Wolf" Detained

On the Italian liner Dante Alighieri, the boarding officers singled out Luciano Lupo, forty-five years old, a citizen of Italy, who created much attention in this country a decade ago as "Lupo the Wolf" head of a gang of Italian counterfeiters.

Lupo showed a document which he said was a warrant of pardon issued to him a year ago by President Harding at a time when the President pardoned others of the gang who were serving a sentence of five years each. Lupo said that he went to Italy in the fall of last year and had returned to his wife and children, now living in this city. He said he returned to America to start an importing business. Lupo also said he had had a severe lesson and planned to be a law-abiding citizen hereafter.

To Question Young Woman

A group of Italians, said to be connected with Lupo in the old days when he was "making money," were at the pier to greet him. He was detained aboard ship and will be taken to Ellis Island today for a hearing.

Gillette Wet to the Heart

Colonel Ransom H. Gillette, of Troy, has been appointed counsel general to the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, according to an announcement made yesterday by the New York division. Colonel Gillette has, for many years, waged active warfare against the Anti-Saloon League. He took office yesterday afternoon at the local headquarters, 366 Madison Avenue.

Colonel Gillette, who served in France with the 106th Infantry, issued this statement: "I'm heart and soul in the fight which is as great a fight for America as was the World War. Just as we won that war, we'll win this."

Mot. Case Postponed

Theatrical Producer Given Time to Prove Michigan Residence

DETROIT, May 13.—Circuit Judge Harry Dingeman's investigation into the legality of the Michigan residence of Oliver Moroso, theatrical producer, at the time of the latter's recent divorce here, was postponed indefinitely to permit him to obtain affidavits of his contention that he resided in Detroit from September, 1918, to 1920.

Steel Cable Imperils Lives

The lives of fifty workmen and passersby were imperiled yesterday in front of Bellevue Hospital when a steel cable, an inch and a half in diameter and weighing several tons, which was stretched between Avenue

A and First Avenue for sewer construction work, broke loose. The cable, stretched twenty feet above the street, was straining on a load of concrete when it pulled loose from its fastenings on the Avenue A end and broke through timbers covering the ditch where laborers were working.

Caruso's Name Valued at \$150,000 on Macaroni

Isaac Barnett, a tailor, forty-six years old, of 614 West 135th Street, was struck on the leg by the cable. He was taken to the hospital suffering from contusions of the ankle.

Man Who Obtained Singer's Consent Sues Manufacturer for Service

Marziale Sisco, who says he obtained permission for the Atlantic Macaroni Company, which has a macaroni factory in Long Island City, to use Enrico Caruso's name on its product, is suing the company for \$150,000 for the service, with interest since 1917, when, he says, he performed his mission.

Sisco says in his complaint that no sum was fixed as his fee when the macaroni company engaged him, but that he was assured that his compensation would be ample. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars, with five years' interest, would be approximately ample, he figures.

MacMasters Says He Only Lent Cash To Brokerage Firm

Father of Bankrupt Dealer Denies He Contributed to Capital; Admits He Had \$550 a Week as Salary

John F. MacMasters, father of Roy H. MacMasters, of the bankrupt brokerage firm of R. H. MacMasters & Co., one of the concerns expelled from the Consolidated Stock Exchange, its transactions being referred to the District Attorney for examination as to whether they appeared yesterday before the referee in bankruptcy, Peter B. Olney, in his office, 68 William Street.

MacMasters testified that he had put money into R. H. MacMasters & Co. and also had made personal loans to his son that could not be regarded as contributions to capital. In November and December of last year, the witness said, he put up \$37,000 to help the firm out of difficulties, and he never had been repaid this sum.

An advance of \$19,000 which the witness said he made to his son, Roy, to enable him to go into the brokerage business was repaid. This was a personal loan which the witness did not regard as an investment in the business of the concern.

The witness denied absolutely that he was a partner in the business. The \$550 a week paid to him, was salary, he testified. It was paid in cash and did not appear on the books of the New York office. It was carried on the books of the offices in Chicago and Milwaukee instead, and was thus kept from the knowledge of the office force in New York. MacMasters testified that he received this big salary because he was able to bring valuable business to the firm.

Some questions which the witness declined to answer. These were questions relating particularly to the trading account of the firm and regarding two payments totaling \$8,000 which he made to the firm. A ruling will be obtained on these questions, after which the witness will be called again. No date has been set for the next hearing.

Weather Report

General Weather Conditions

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Pressure continued high to-day over the northern Rocky Mountain and northern plateau regions and the Pacific states, and it was relatively low over all other sections. There have been local showers within the last twenty-four hours in the upper Ohio Valley, portions of the lake region, North Dakota, eastern Montana, the Canadian Northwest and at scattered points in the Atlantic states south of Maryland and in the west Gulf states.

In all other parts of the country the weather remained fair. The temperature continued above normal to-day over the eastern half of the country, except New England, and it was considerably below normal throughout the plains states and the Northwest.

The indications are for mostly fair weather without material change in temperature in the states east of the Mississippi River during the next two days.

Forecast for Week

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Weather outlook for the week beginning Monday:

Atlantic and Gulf states, Ohio Valley and Tennessee, region of the Great Lakes, upper Mississippi and lower Missouri valleys, Rocky Mountain and plateau regions—Generally fair and moderate temperature.

Pacific states—Generally fair and normal temperature, but with a probability of occasional showers on the north coast.

Southern New England—Generally fair to-night and to-morrow; little change in temperature; light to moderate northwest winds.


