

A TRIPLE UNVEILING. Lord Byng, Governor General of Canada, standing beside the Canadian Pacific War Memorial he has just unveiled in the Windsor Station at Montreal. Simultaneously replicas of the statue were unveiled in the C. P. R. stations at Winnipeg by the Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba and at Vancouver by the Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia. At the same time bronze tablets were unveiled at twenty-five points along the C. P. R. system.
