Western Golf Association to Sponsor National Championship, With Scholarship as Prize; Chicago Chosen for '22 Event; New York Favored for '23

CHICAGO, May 15 (By The Associated Press).—Caddies of American golf links are to have a national championship tournament annually under a plan announced to-night by Albert R. Gates, president of the Western Golf Association, which is to sponsor the affair.

In honor of Chick Evans, who rose from caddie to national amateur and open champion, the first tournament will be held this summer at his home club, Edgewater, Chicago. Evans, who has won more golf cups than any other person, will offer a cup for the winner of the title, and this will become the annual trophy. Evans has a collection of some 500 cups.

The date and plan of financing will be announced more definitely later. It is planned to hold next year's meet in New York and then award the event to various cities.
