Racing Opens This Week at Belmont Park

Real Thrills Await Society in Program of Outdoor Attractions, Including Horse Show at Devon Westchester Club To Start Season

Dinner Dance to Follow Spring Meet of County and Fairfield Hounds

MANY interesting outdoor attractions figure on society's program for this week. While there have been two or three events which attracted society in large numbers in the early part of the month—the races at Belmont Park Terminal and the Nassau Kennel Club show a week ago—the real thrills come this week. The opening of the racing season at Belmont Park takes place on Thursday and the races will continue until June 15. The horse show at Devon, Pa., May 26 to 30 will take many over to Philadelphia at the end of the week, while in Westchester County there are a number of interesting affairs scheduled.

The opening at Belmont Park promises to be the most brilliant in years, judging from the meet held early in the month by the United Hunt Racing Association at Belmont Park Terminal and by the attendance at other racetracks in the last few weeks. The Turf and Field Club will be the scene of gay luncheon parties before the races, and all the Long Island set and society from other sections will be on hand when the bugle sounds for the first race.

Westchester Billmore Club To Hold Opening Thursday

On Thursday the formal opening of the Westchester Billmore Country Club, of which Mr. John McE Bowman is president and Mr. Eugene D. Miller secretary-treasurer, will take place. On that day the 650 acres of the Westchester Billmore, situated between Harrison and Rye, will be thrown open to the guests and members. A splendid program has been provided and a buffet luncheon will be served. There will be a concert by the Seventh Regiment Military Band and a four-ball match between Walter Hagen, "Jim" Barnes, "Tommy" Armour and Cuthbert S. Butcher.

On Saturday night a dinner-dance will be held at the club for members only. This will follow the annual spring meet earlier in the day of the Fairfield and Westchester County Hounds, which is to take place at James McClenahan's Nutbourne Farm, King Street and Harrison Avenue, Port Chester. A feature of the day will be the ladies' race, to be ridden for a distance of three-quarters of a mile on turf, for horses owned and ridden by women members of the organization.
