Mayor Hylan said last night he didn't want to be Governor. He was speaking at Stapleton, S. I. "I want to say right here and now that I am not a candidate," he said, "and if you gave me a certificate of election to-night and my fare to Albany to-morrow, I would not accept the job. "There are some who would like to send me to Albany to get me out of the city, but I was elected Mayor for four years, I have got a big job on my hands and I am going to devote all four years to it. "However, I am deeply interested in next fall's campaign, and if you will work with me, we will send a man to Albany who will work with me and between us we'll smother the transit trust and send that crowd back to the city to work for a living."
