Two Roads Are Competitive, U. S. Supreme Bench Decides in Ending Control Through Stock or Lease

Last of Merger Actions

Federal Suit Filed in 1914 to Compel Severance by Invoking Anti-Trust Act

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Dissolution of ownership and control of the Central Pacific Railway by the Southern Pacific Company was ordered to-day by the Supreme Court in an opinion delivered by Justice Day. The decision, which was the last in railroad merger suits, held that the two lines were competitive, because of their official connections prior to going upon the bench, did not participate. Justice McKenna delivered a short dissent.

Pointing out that the difficulty in the separation of the interests of the Reading Company and the Reading Coal and Iron Company lies in the lien of the general mortgage which covers much of the property of the former and all the stock and property of the latter, and is not redeemable until 1927, the court directed that the district court should, after a hearing of all interested parties, determine the respective values of the property of the two companies, which are subject to lien of the general mortgage.
