POLO GROUNDS, N. Y., June 17.—Johnny Morrison, of the Pirates, pitched against fate yesterday, and lost 2 to 1 in the tenth inning. When a hurler holds the opposition to six hits in ten full innings, he is usually entitled to receive something else than a blot on his 'scutcheon, and the Giants have contracted a habit of walloping the Pirates in each and every contest at the Polo Grounds, and they see no good reason for a change of heart.

With the score tied at one run all in the tenth inning of the pastime in the evening below Congan's Bluff yesterday the Pirate twirler threw a ball over the middle of the pan, while Casey Steiger was standing idly on, let in hand. Casey woke to life, swung viciously, and the ball sailed up and far away to the upper grandstand. It was the first ball pitched in the Giants' half of the inning, and there was more on it than the twirler knew. It meant the fourth out for the Pirates in this contest, a clean sweep of the series for Casey Steiger, and the ninth success in being able to walloping the Pirates on the Polo Grounds.
