The tournament will be for mixed doubles. The men who will be invited will include whatever stars are not playing in other tournaments. It is certain that M. Andre Gobert and M. Borotra, of the French team, whose playing was a feature in the last invitation tournament, will come to Newport for this event.

Mrs. Barger Wallace, chairman of the women's tennis committee of the Casino, has arranged to have the feature matches played on the clubhouse court. Boxes will be erected for spectators on the upper and lower balconies of the clubhouse.

Cornelius Stevenson, 80, Dies in Atlantic City

Was Injured in Auto Accident Year Ago and Never Fully Recovered

ATLANTIC CITY, Aug. 22.—Cornelius Stevenson, 80 years old, died today in the Hotel Dennis. He had been a leading lawyer in Philadelphia and was a member of a family prominent there. A little more than a year ago he was run down by a taxicab in Philadelphia. One leg was broken and he never fully recovered from the effects of the accident.

FRANK W. HOYT Frank W. Hoyt, sixty-three years old, well known writer and editor, died last night at his home, 261 Claremont Avenue, after an illness of several weeks. Mr. Hoyt had lived here for twenty-five years.

LEUTENANT THOMAS F. DICKSON Police Lieutenant Thomas F. Dickson, fifty-five years old, a member of the Jersey City Police Department for more than a quarter of a century, died at his home in Jersey City yesterday. Lieutenant Dickson had several honorary mentions to his credit. He recently had been attached to the Montgomery Street station. A wife and two sons survive him.

ARTHUR BREEZE PROAL NUTLEY, N. J., Aug. 22.—Arthur Breeze Proal, a civil and electrical engineer known of an expert in matters of fuel reclamation and who was employed on the Panama Canal, died of pneumonia at his home here today. He was fifty-two years of age, a graduate of Stevens Institute. His wife is president of the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs.
