Horse Show Week Opens At Newport

Invitation Tennis Tournament, 'The Viking' Pageant and Aspegren Ball Among Other Features

Net Stars Ready To Enter Contest

Series of Tableaux To Be Enacted by 100 in Unique Norse Production

NEWPORT, August 26.

NEWPORT prepared during the last few days for what will be the apex of its present season this coming week, features of which will be the annual Newport Horse Show at the Casino, an initial tennis tournament in mixed doubles at the Casino, a pageant, "The Viking," at the Art Association and the big ball by Mr. and Mrs. John Aspegren at Aspen Hall on September 2. In numbers the summer colony is larger now than at any time this year.

An exhibition which has always attracted the close attention of society is the annual Newport Horse Show, which will be given the first three days of the week at the Casino. The sale of boxes has been greater than at any time since before the war, while the entrants in the sixty-five classes are such that a show of the usual high standard is assured. Mr. Reginald C. Vanderbilt, president of the horse show, has engaged Lady Dillon, Fortitude, Sandy Point, Fashion and Ely in the harness and breeding classes.

Mr. Moses Taylor, son of the late Mr. Henry A. C. Taylor, will be a new exhibitor this year and will show horses from his father's Glen Farm in the saddle classes. Mrs. Walter H. While the Horse Show will appeal to many, the invitation mixed doubles tennis tournament at the Casino, in which a number of the leading men and women stars of the country will appear, will be the object of interest. This tournament will likewise be conducted at the Casino the first three days of next week, the principal matches being on the clubhouse court. Mrs. Barger Wallach, chairman of the women's tennis committee, had boxes ordered on the upper and lower balconies of the clubhouse, and, judging from the advance sale, many in the summer colony will witness these feature matches.

An event in which there has been much preparation and in which nearly 100 in the summer colony are participating as members of the cast will be staged Tuesday evening at the Art Association when the pageant, "The Viking," based on Longfellow's poem, "The Skeleton in Armor," which in turn, was inspired by the old stone mill that stands in plain sight of the Art Association, will be given. A fancy costume ball will follow the pageant, with prizes offered for the handsomest, most correct and most ingenious costumes, while preceding the pageant will be a supper.

There will also be a series of ten tableaux, each of which has been carefully rehearsed. A special stage has been erected and fully equipped on the Art Association grounds by Mrs. Frank W. Fraunhof, who has taken an active interest and who helped arrange the scenario and many details. The scenes for these tableaux will be thrown on a huge screen by means of a new apparatus which projects specially prepared plates on the screen.

Already more than thirty boxes have been sold for the performance of "Chauve-Souris" at \$100 each, which is to be given in the grounds of the Parrish Art Museum on the evening of September 3 for the benefit of the Rogers Memorial Library. The programs have been issued this week and are works of art and will be preserved as souvenirs of the occasion. The entertainment will be one of the largest and most important events ever given in Southampton. The programs were made up by the artists who came to the original programs for the first presentation of the performance of "Chauve-Souris" in this country.

Mr. Louis Simmons and Mr. Morris Gest have been working for the last two weeks to make the programs an interesting feature of the evening. The open air theater is now well under way in the grounds of the Parrish Art Museum.

Series of Entertainments After the Performance

A series of delightful entertainments has been planned to take place the week following the performance of "Chauve-Souris" in the gardens of the Parrish Art Museum to be given in the same open air theater that is now under construction. Mr. K. N. Das Gupta, director of the English Union of East and West, and the author of many plays and poems, will present a number of plays among them "The Rabinranath Tagore, who won the Nobel prize. The first will be given Thursday afternoon, September 7, another of the following afternoon and again Saturday afternoon, this latter being also for children accompanied by their parents or guardians, and the last to be given Monday afternoon. These plays will be costumed in the dress of the East and will be played by a company which Mr. Das Gupta has selected in New York and Washington, where his plays have been seen. The proceeds of these performances will be devoted to some charity not yet named.

The same week and in connection with the plays an exhibition of the ancient paintings of India, including the following: "The exquisite design, shawis, embroideries of rare beauty, as well as other objects of art from the East, will be shown at the Parrish Memorial Hall, in Herriek Road. This will come at the close of the Chase memorial art exhibition that is now in progress in Memorial Hall.

A New York architect is making the plans for a new building to take the place of the Madison clubhouse in East Hampton, that was burned two weeks ago. It is proposed that the new clubhouse be built between the dunes and the residence of Mr. Frank B. W. Borg and Egbert Lane.
