

This concert, with others during the season, was broadcast through the efforts of Major Kendall Banning, editor of the magazine "Popular Radio," to more than a million radio fans. The program was transmitted by wire twenty-five miles to the WJZ broadcasting station in Newark, and there sent out by radio. Reports were received, even from ships at sea, indicating that the broadcasting, which was the greatest feat of its kind, was eminently successful. The great stadium was packed to overflowing on the night this picture was made, but the flashlight, one of the most extensive ever undertaken, shows only a fraction of those who heard the concert, when the wireless is taken into consideration.
