


Supreme Court Power Upheld By Beveridge

Artists and Costumes Run as Rain Mars Fete

Charged by a rival merchant with obstructing the sidewalk, Oles conducted his own defense to-day and was acquitted. Spirited tilts enlivened the proceedings when Oles cross-examined his competitor.

School Budget Of \$95,007,766 Comes Up Today

Passed by Board of Education, It Must Now Go Under the Scrutiny of the Board of Estimate

Increase of \$4,733,783 Salary Jumps for Administrative Staff; Continuation Teachers a Problem

The Board of Estimate will have an opportunity to-day to consider a budget of \$95,007,766.99 adopted unanimously yesterday by the Board of Education.

The 1923 budget is an increase of \$4,733,783.21 over what the city appropriated for the expenses of the schools for 1922. More than three months were required by the reference and research division and the financial committee of the Board of Education in putting the new budget in shape.

Arthur S. Somers, chairman of the budget committee, said that as originally made it called for an appropriation of more than \$102,000,000, but this figure was reduced \$7,000,000 with the assistance of the heads of departments, superintendents and other. Mr. Somers declared that in reducing the original figures the board was determined to school activity and that no department would suffer.

Realtor Is Granted Divorce

Accused Wife of Infidelity While He Was Absent

Charles S. Van Wagoner, formerly a real estate broker of Westwood, N. J., was granted a final decree of divorce yesterday from Margaret S. Van Wagoner, whom he accused of infidelity. Anthony M. Colucci, who had a rooming house at the Van Wagoner home during the time the real estate man was in the mountains for his health, is named as co-respondent.

U. S. Breaks With Soviet On Survey of Russia

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Negotiations of an informal nature between the American and Soviet governments regarding the proposal to send an American technical commission to survey the economic situation in Russia, are regarded by government officials here as closed. It was authoritatively declared in official quarters to-day that this government was not willing to meet the terms fixed by the Soviet authorities, who asked for a reciprocal exchange of Russian and American investigation commissions.


