Burglars Steal Big Safe Under Nose of Police

Get \$10,000 Loot in Arverne With Stationed Officer But Twenty Feet Away; One of Four Robberies

Catch Two With Silk Loot

Closed West Side Home Is Robbed of \$10,000; Newark Theater Loses \$2,000

Working literally under the noses of the police, burglars in two instances yesterday indulged in raids involving a total loot of cash, jewelry and silks estimated at \$11,500. A third burglary netted its perpetrators household property which an early inventory valued at \$10,000.

In one instance two alleged burglars were captured as they were completing their getaways, but in the largest robbery they not only escaped unobserved but took with them a heavy safe which had hoisted through a restaurant window directly facing a police booth and only about twenty feet distant from the latter.

The safe entertainment was conducted from the restaurant of Arnold Wetzel, at Sixty-seventh Street and the Boulevard, Arverne, Queens, in the early hours of the morning. Apparently working in businesslike and leisurely fashion, the burglars, after forcing an entrance into the establishment, rolled the safe from its regular position to the rear and then dragged it through a window plainly visible from the police booth.

Find Broken Strong-Box

How they then lugged the safe away is still in doubt, but it is surmised they dumped it into a waiting automobile, as the strong-box, broken into and completely riddled, was found later in an alley less than two blocks from the police booth.

Wetzel, the restaurant proprietor, reported that the safe had contained \$10,000 in cash, jewelry and valuable papers. Five strangers observed in the vicinity on Monday are suspected of having committed the burglary, but no clue as to their identity has been announced.

The other raid conducted virtually in the police presence was from a tenth-story loft in a building at 304 East Twenty-third Street, directly in the rear of the East Twenty-second Street police station. Here, however, a flashlight operated by the burglars was observed by Detectives Gillman and Lambert from the police station, and they went to the loft structure to investigate. Gillman climbing the fire-escape and Lambert going up an interior stairway.

Fights Detective

On the eighth-floor landing Gillman met a man coming down with, it is alleged, two bundles of silk shirts. The intruder was powerfully built, and a struggle, in which he endeavored to hurl the detective from the fire-escape, ensued. It was ended by a blow from Gillman's blackjack, and the prisoner, who gave the name of Daniel Messenger, was taken to the police station with his loot.

A little later a man giving the name of John Boyle and two more bundles of shirts—the total value of the four bundles was estimated at \$1,500—were taken from a Twenty-third Street lodging house. A patrolman had seen Boyle enter with the bundles and reported the fact.

The burglars gained entrance to the loft, which is the shirt factory of Brooks Brothers, by cutting out a glass panel. A jimmy, two screwdrivers and a flashlight were found in the loft, it was reported. Both men arrested were charged with burglary.

Suspect "Vacation" Gang

The other \$10,000 robbery of the day was reported by Joseph H. Wise, a member of the firm of Davis & Carter, all merchants, of 58 Leonard Street. On returning with his family to his home at 10 West Seventy-fourth Street, from a Maine vacation, Mr. Wise discovered the house in disorder from cellar to attic, with the doors of all the closets jammed open and furs, clothing, silverware and jewelry missing. From one receptacle alone a chest, silverware valued at nearly \$3,000 had been taken.

The burglars had no upset the house as to make it uninhabitable for the time being, and Mr. Wise and his family moved to the Hotel Netherland temporarily. Police of the West Sixty-eighth Street station are investigating the burglary, which is believed to have been perpetrated by a "summer vacation" gang operating at the homes of well-to-do West Siders.

An early morning burglary in Newark, at the Monks' Theatre, 208 Ferry Street, netted the robbers \$2,200 in cash after they had forced open the theater safe.

Sing Sing Cuts Living Cost to 6 Cents a Meal

Warden Lawes of Sing Sing prison read in the papers yesterday morning that the National Guardsmen were boasting because the average cost a meal in camp at Peekskill was 15 cents, and promptly went the militia one better by announcing that in August the prison had made a new economy record by feeding its inmates at an average cost of less than 6 cents a meal.

White Man's Hand Sent Negro Editor With Threat

Object Comes in Mail From New Orleans With Note Signed "K. K. K."

Detectives summoned from the West 185th Street station to open a suspicious looking package received yesterday afternoon by A. Philip Randolph, editor of "The Messenger," a negro monthly, unwrapped a white man's left hand instead of the bomb that had been suspected. The postmark had been effaced by the water into which Randolph had plunged the parcel while he was waiting for the detectives, and only the words "From a friend, New Orleans," written on the wrapper, and a note signed "K. K. K.," attached to the hand, remained to give some clue to the sender.

"Listen, Randolph," the letter began, "we have been watching you and your papers for some time, but we want you to understand before we act. There is no space in our race for you and your crowd if you can't get along in your own race movement. We have sent you a sample of our work to make you watch your step.

"Don't think we can't get you. It will be just as easy as in Georgia. The reference to Randolph's inability to get along with his own race is thought to point to "The Messenger's" attacks upon the Universal Negro Improvement Association and its founder, Marcus Garvey, the "provisional president of the Republic of Africa."

Ship Captain Indicted In Mid-Ocean Killing

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In the indictment it is charged that Captain Miles did "with force and arms willfully and with deliberate premeditation and malice" kill and wound Harry Baxter, a pantryman, on June 24, in consequence of which Baxter died June 25 in the ship's hospital. The assault is alleged to have been committed while the vessel was on her way from this port to Tilbury, England. The indictment was obtained by G. Tarleton Goldthwaite, assistant United States district attorney.

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Fighting Broker Sent to Bellevue From Waldorf

Charles Counselman, Princeton Graduate, Overpowered by Employees After Found Muttering in Room

Registered With Doctor

Well Known at Yale Club Here and Said to Have Been Divorced Recently

Charles Counselman, Princeton graduate and well-known Chicago stock broker, was taken yesterday from the Waldorf Astoria to Bellevue for observation after being overpowered by hotel employees.

Mr. Counselman registered at the Waldorf several days ago with Dr. R. L. Reedliffe, also of Chicago. The latter refused last night to give any information concerning the broker. Mr. Counselman occupied Room 702.

A disturbance in this room yesterday attracted the attention of a hotel employee, and after the room had been entered and its occupant was found to be muttering incoherently, other employees were called, and an effort made to quiet Mr. Counselman. He showed resistance, and was then downed until three men had taken hold of him. His resistance stopped as suddenly as it started, though he continued his muttering as he was being taken to the ambulance. His condition was reported last night to be virtually unchanged.

Mr. Counselman is the son of a prominent Chicago broker, and had been living for some time at the Congress Hotel in Chicago. He checked out August 21 and left no forwarding address, according to dispatches from Chicago last night.

It was said at the Waldorf that little was known there of Mr. Counselman, and that as far as the hotel was able to determine the broker never had been a guest there before. His actions up to the time of the disturbance in the room had not attracted attention, it was said.

Inquiries at the Yale Club last night disclosed that Mr. Counselman was well known there. He recently was divorced from his wife, who is a daughter of Samuel L. Felton, president of the Chicago & Great Western Railway. It was said last night that Mr. Felton and his daughter were either at a New York hotel or at Watch Hill, R. I.

The house physician at the Waldorf, Dr. Robert Ames, attended Mr. Counselman prior to the arrival of the ambulance.

A Mrs. Meecham, of Westbrook, Conn., said to be Counselman's mother, was notified and she started for New York at once.
