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Board Is Silent After Hearing Hylan Tube Plan

Dates Fixed for Public Meetings as Mayor Gives His Views on Gigantic Scheme to Estimate Body

Prepared Statement Read

Early Dates Insisted On to Avoid the Appearance of 'Playing Politics,' He Says

Mayor Hylan interrupted his vacation at Saratoga Springs to come to the city yesterday and present his \$600,000,000 transit plan at a special meeting of the Board of Estimate.

Comptroller Craig suggested postponement of the hearings until late in October, but the Mayor insisted upon holding them this month and early in October, declaring that otherwise he would be accused of "playing politics."

The first hearing will be held on September 15 at 2 p. m. in the Council Chamber in City Hall on the sections of the plan affecting Harlem, Washington Heights and the Bronx.

The Mayor in his statement claimed for his plan that it would "relieve transit congestion in Manhattan and provide adequate rapid transit in all boroughs for many years to come."

At the present time, those who use both subway systems to go from one part of Brooklyn to another, or to go from Brooklyn to Manhattan Island, are obliged to pay two fares, or 10 cents, because the city-owned subway system is operated by two companies.

By the recapture of existing subway lines the city will not only be able to provide the longest possible ride for a single five-cent fare, but it will save the city \$10,000,000 each year, which we now include in the tax budget to pay interest on subway bonds.

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Cafes Raided After 9 Die of Poison Liqueur

Demand is said to have been made on the police by representatives of civic organizations that immediate investigation be made into sales of liquor by drug stores, ostensibly on prescription.

It also is said to have been charged that many of the smaller drug stores are buying alcohol at \$6 a gallon under permits, coloring it with coloring and selling the product at an exorbitant price of \$12 a quart.

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
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


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
