By W. J. Macbeth Robert L. Gerry's William Tell won the Lynbrook Selling Stakes, the feature of the second day of the fall meeting at Jamaica. This two-year-old colt, which was admirably ridden by Jockey L. McAtee, ran the five and a half furlongs in the fast time of 1:05 2-5, and displayed considerable improvement over his recent performances. He was overlooked in the betting, his price kiting from 5 to 2 to 4 to 1.

But in pulling down the \$3,200 that rewarded the winning effort, William Tell displayed far better than usual juvenile pliancy. It was a close fit for him at the end. He beat the Ranococas Stable's outsider, Aladdin, by the shortest of snouts. But this was because he suddenly trotted fifty yards from home after making a sensational run up on the outside. Blue Seing, the favorite, was beaten off four lengths, finished third.

Most of the money showed for Blue Seing and Silk Tassel, which went to the post even favorites. There was some excuse for Blue Seing. This one had a tempestuous journey. Trotter Equals World's Mark for 3-Year-Olds in Winning First Heat

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 3.—Frank H. Ellis's Lee Worthy, driven by Ben White, won the thirtieth renewal of the Kentucky Futurity in convincing style this afternoon, equalling the record for the stake and the world's record for three-year-olds in the first heat. This is the same winning combination that landed the junior division of the same stake on Monday.

The bad behavior of Peter Earl, causing him to be distanced in the opening heat, was a great disappointment to the crowd, as it had been expected that a great battle would be staged by the pair.

Peter Earl was acting badly when the horses were first scored and upon finally getting the word made a break and almost ran over the outside fence near the eighth pole, getting so far behind that he could never catch up with the field.
