Fine Specimens To Be Seen at Clarke Gallery Tomorrow

Carved Renaissance woodwork from a villa in Florence and many other specimens of Italian art and decoration are included in the exhibition to be opened tomorrow at the Clarke galleries, 42 East Fifty-eighth Street. The interior consists of five doorways with Corinthian columns, in gilt and old blue, the wainscoting similarly colored in panels with carved ornamentation, and the wall candelabra in design motivated by the old Roman.

William S. Opydke, 62 Years a Lawyer, Dies in Englewood

Dean of Active Profession in City; Also Was Veteran Member of University Council and Ex-Legislator

Dean of the active legal profession in this city, in which he had been continuously engaged for more than sixty years, and of the Council of New York University, of which he had been a member for thirty-nine years, William Stryker Opydke died on Friday at a private hospital at Englewood, N. J., whither he had gone for treatment only a short time before. He was a descendant of Gabyret Opydke, one of the earliest Dutch settlers of New York, and was a son of George Opydke, one of the Free Soil founders of the Republican party, who was Mayor of New York in 1852 and 1853.

He was born in this city on October 6, 1860, and was graduated from New York University in 1886. Among his classmates were his brother, Charles Stryker Opydke, and Charles H. Van Brunt, long a justice of the Supreme Court of this state. After studying law at Albany he began practice in this city in 1886 and continued in active practice until the early part of last month, when impaired health compelled his retirement. He served in the Common Council of this city in 1884 and in the State Assembly in 1879. He was elected to the Council of New York University in 1903 and remained a member until his death, for a number of years serving as its secretary. He was member of the Beta Kappa and the Phi Upsilon Fraternities, the National Geographic Society, and the Metropolitan University, City Reform, Down Town, Transportation, National Art and Poetry, Historical clubs. He was married in October, 1883, to Miss Margaret E. Post, of this city, daughter of Dr. Alfred C. Post, who died in 1911, and is survived by one son, Alfred C. P. Opydke.
