## Envoys Bring Brilliant Days To Washington

Return of Ambassadors to Capital Adds to Importance of Many Events in Reign of the Little Season

## Fetes for Mountbattens

All of Cabinet Members Are Expected Back at Early Date; Flower Exhibit Held

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The return of the Ambassadors of France, Belgium and Great Britain and that of several lesser ministers and lesser diplomats give the little season quite a stable appearance and when, after the arrival of Lord and Lady Mountbatten on Tuesday the attendant stream of entertainments for them begins, Washington will be just about as lively as it is going to be in the next twelve months.

The Ambassador of France and Mme. Jusserand hurried on to Washington after arriving in New York and are now established in the Embassy, while the Ambassador of Belgium and Baroness de Carter lingers on in New York but will be settled in the Embassy by the Belgian national holiday, Saturday, November 11.

The Ambassador of Great Britain and Lady Geddes were merely taking a trip to Ottawa to greet the new Governor General and they returned to the Embassy Thursday. Their first really important entertainment this month will be the dinner Friday for Lord and Lady Mountbatten. Following the day of the arrival here of the Mountbattens, as guests of Colonel Robert M. Thompson and Mrs. Thompson, their hosts will entertain a large dinner party for them and earlier that day Mrs. Lawrence Townsend will give a tea for the Mountbattens. The arrival of Mme. Mathieu, who was met in New York by her husband, the Ambassador of Chile, she had spent the summer and early autumn abroad, was also an enlivening element.

During the week the Minister of Switzerland and Mme. Peter and the Minister of Sweden and Mme. Welander came from abroad. Then there was the resignation of the Ambassador of Italy, who was much liked by the few who knew him while he was here. His departure was a loss to the life of the capital more than he was compelled by official etiquette. Another loss was felt in the departure of Count de Chambrun, who only weeks ago arrived in the city and Mme. Jusserand before leaving for his new post in Japan.

President's Cabinet Soon To Return to Capital

The President's Cabinet is beginning to reassemble and will soon be back in Washington again. Mr. Hughes, the Secretary of State, was absent for a brief time in New England. Mr. Henry C. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture, finished his campaigning and returned to Washington on Thursday, and several others of the Cabinet are now in Washington.

Mrs. Henry C. Wallace has been the most active Cabinet hostess this autumn and not because of any special occasion, but because she has had the honor of the Department of Agriculture in the absence of the Secretary.
