F. S. Gannon, Rail Expert, Dies After Long Illness

Former Road President Was Stricken Two Years Ago; Was 71 Years Old

Frank S. Gannon, railroad expert and for many years president of the Montana, Wyoming & Southern Railroad, died yesterday at his home, 300 Bard Avenue, Livingston, Staten Island, after a lingering illness. He was seventy-one years old.

Born in Spring Valley, Rockland County, in 1851, Mr. Gannon entered the railroad service after his graduation from public school. He was connected with the Erie, Long Island and Pennsylvania railroads for many years and went to Staten Island as general manager of the Baltimore & Ohio in 1902. He was connected at one time or another with several Southern railroads, having been president of the Norfolk & Southern Railroad and vice-president of the New York City Railway Company.

About two years ago he suffered an apoplectic stroke and resigned all his interests except as director of the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank and occasionally giving his services as railroad expert.

He is survived by his wife, seven sons and a daughter. Frank S. Gannon Jr., recently was appointed to the New York State Supreme Court. The funeral will be held to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock in St. Peter's R. C. Church, at New Brighton. Burial will be in St. Peter's Cemetery.
