THE MONEY IN THE VAULTS SAFE.

Over a Hundred Dead Bodies Recovered.

FORTY THREES SHOT IN THE STREETS.

The Disarmed Citizens Encamped on the Prairies.

PROVISIONS GOING INTO THE CITY.

The terrible calamity which has plunged the great heart of the nation in sorrow leaves none of its terrors with the lapse of time.

Further despatches, giving more extended information, are constantly being received, and they out too plainly reveal the fact that all has not been told.

The blackened ruins, the smoking embers, the starving, shelterless people, all described with sickening vividness.

The fearful state of society, which requires the strong arm of military law to hold it in check, is but another evidence of widespread demoralization in the ill-fated city.

Gen. Sheridan, with 1,000 soldiers from Omaha, has taken it upon himself to crush out lawlessness and preserve peace and order among the suffering population so far as in his power lies.

The despatches state with grave horror the method adopted to accomplish this. Thieves, pickpockets, and incendiaries are not arrested. More than fifty have been

shot down in the streets.

Further reports with reference to the probable loss of life seem about to be confirmed.

Already ninety blackened corpses have been removed from the ruins, and but a small portion of the burnt district has been searched.

Doubtless there are many who will never be distinguished from the heaps of ashes and debris into which they fell.

Meantime, reports are reaching us of deaths in large numbers from exposure and over-exertion.

The weak and delicate, the invalids, and the women and children, have suffered excruciatingly.

On the bleak prairie, with no shelter save heaven's canopy, it is not strange that many have died.

It is said that hundreds have succumbed to these terrible afflictions.

The danger of starvation seems to be over. Car loads of provisions have poured in from every city in the West, while tons and tons of supplies of all kinds are now reaching in from the east.

And now, happily have the parastings of the people been opened.

It is estimated that \$2,000,000 has already been expended to relieve the more pressing wants of the stricken people, and doubtless as much more will go forward within the week.

The Western railway companies are doing their best to thin out the number of mouths to be fed by conveying all who have friends living elsewhere to their homes.

Thousands have availed themselves of this opportunity. The losses are of course undetermined, although they cannot fall short of \$200,000,000. It is enough to say that the city is a mass of ruins, and that thousands upon thousands have lost all they possessed in the world.

It is gratifying, however, to know that there are some who still remain plucky enough to begin over again. The proprietors of the Sherman House have leased a new hotel, unburned by the fire.

The Times and Tribune will both print editions this morning. Several banks and mercantile houses have opened, in unpretending places it is true, but they have opened.

Owing to the timely warning all cars and valuable property were got out of the depot before the flames reached it, and are in a place of safety.

The streets outside of the track of the fire were crowded with fugitives and awe-stricken lookers on, who were waiting for the arrival of the fire engines.

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THE PHILADELPHIA RIOTS.

THE QUAKER CITY'S INFELIX ELECTION BLOODIED.

Thirty Persons Killed or Wounded—Seventeen Police-men were Killed on Charge of Obstructing the Riot.

Philadelphia, Oct. 11.—During the riot on Tuesday afternoon, in addition to the twenty-two persons already known to have been killed and wounded, Bernard Duke, a white man, was slain in the scuffle by another white man named George West; James Clippy, a colored man, and John Herkness, a white man, were also shot, but not seriously.

An unknown white man was killed at Seventh and Lombard streets. Geo. Heald is not expected to live. Policeman Lewis Linger was shot in the head.

A colored man who witnessed the killing of Otto von Katz yesterday says that the deceased, when attacked, jumped on a street car, pursued by his assailant, and ran through the car and jumped out from the front platform. The car was then fired. No additional death was occurred among the wounded at the hospital, but two persons are in a critical condition.

Seventeen police officers, arrested on warrants issued for obstructing the riots at Sixth and Lombard streets, were brought before the court of Quarter Sessions this morning, but the cases were postponed on account of the absence of witnesses.

THE OCTOBER ELECTIONS.

Ohio Claimed by the Legislature by 25,000 Majorities. The Legislature returned from Cincinnati, Oct. 11.—Election returns from eight wards and a number of precincts of this city have not been received. The Republicans claim the election of eleven out of thirteen candidates to the Legislature, and all the county ticket but County Commissioners, but there has been some scratching of the result has not been decided. There never was such general voting of mixed tickets. It is probable that the Republican State ticket has 1,500 majority in Hamilton county.

Returns from 55 counties, townships, and wards show a majority for the State ticket of 10,000, a Republican majority of 2,000 over the Democrats. Not enough returns have been received to give the result of the election in the State at large, though the indications are that it is Republican.

The House in Pennsylvania.

Philadelphia, Oct. 11.—Complete returns of the city makes Stanton's majority for Auditor, 10,340; Stokes' for Mayor, 8,901; McCreary, for City Comptroller, 15,533; Mann's, for District Attorney, 2,154. The Select Council will contain 21 Republicans and 3 Democrats, and the Common Council will contain 100 Republicans and 100 Democrats. The Republican majority in joint ballot of 43.
