

GENERAL SICKLES ON CUBA.

SPAIN'S GOVERNMENT APPROVING THE HAVANA MURDERS.

The Crimes of the Volunteers Known and Countenanced by the Spanish Government for the Subjugation of the Island—Henry Curtis Kizer to Join the Army of Cuba—An Interesting Interview with our Late Representative at Madrid.

Through the courtesy of Dr. Carnochan a letter was introduced to Gen. Sickles on board the Cuba yesterday. The General received him cordially. Col. B. T. Morgan, Major W. Ballard, Major A. C. He said that he was glad to see the shores of America again, and that after his return from Washington he intended to spend a month in New York. He went to Washington on Tuesday.

I have never been asked to leave Madrid on account of any political difficulties.
