A Description of the Precious Stones that have Already been Taken to San Francisco for Examination. From the San Francisco Bulletin.

The existence of deposits of the precious stones in Eastern Arizona and Western Mexico has been well authenticated for many years. The Aztecs, at the time of the Spanish conquest, had long been mining for gold, emeralds, and turquoises, which are not known to be found in any part of the present territory of Mexico.

There are also many ruins which were long mistaken for temples for religious worship, but which later investigation has demonstrated to have been intruded mining camps, built by the Aztecs.
