

ANOTHER LITERARY THEIF.

Prof. George W. Schellie, arrested, and over the robbery of the books of the Congressional Library.

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THE OLD WORLD'S NEWS.

The Northwestern Boundary Question Reopened—The Government Severely Criticized—Earl Granville's Foreign Policy One of Conciliation and Humiliation.

LONDON, May 2.—In the House of Commons to-night Lord George Hamilton, member for Middlesex, called attention to the nature of the reference to the Treaty of 1846, which under the Treaty of Washington was submitted, together with the northwestern boundary question, to the decision of the German Emperor.

He regretted that the English Government had allowed that part of the Oregon treaty an interpretation fatal to the just claims of England.

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THE MORRISIANA TRAGEDY.
