What is the true name of the book which we know as Ecclesiastes, and when and by whom was it written?

As regards the date of the treatise, M. Rénon is led by the various processes of textual criticism to fix it at about a hundred years before the birth of Christ.

As to the author of Ecclesiastes, M. Rénon suggests that he was, perhaps, some great-grandfather of Anna, the high priest who was crucified with Jesus.

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The text of Ecclesiastes is corrupted by many errors of the copyists, but had it been handed down to us with literal fidelity it would still present difficulties.

It is clear, too, that certain reflections would be out of place, or even devoid of any sense at all, in the mouth of a sovereign, like, for instance, the remark in the thirteenth and fourteenth verses of the fourth chapter.

Ecclesiastes is to pass for the most obscure book in the Bible. This was the verdict of the theologians, which, in point of fact, was quite unfounded.

Such notions in a Greek, or in our time, would pass for rank impiety, and would be infinitely associated with a denial of the Divinity.

It is plain that the impenetrable obscurity with which to our author's eyes, the world's government is enshrouded would be dissipated if Ecclesiastes had the slightest notion of a life beyond.

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The construction is not firm enough. The general purport of the book—the method of unravelling the confessions of an aged king, disgusted with life, so as to reach by every kind of path the deduction "All is vanity"—is indicated with rare felicity; but it is not followed up with sufficient boldness.

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
