

ROBBED BY MASKED MEN.

COUNTY TREASURER BRIDGE BOUND, GUADED, AND LEFT IN A PAUL.

A Dependent Struggle in the Court House at Springfield, Mass.—Thousands of Dollars in Checks and Valuable Papers Taken.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Jan. 18.—A daring robbery was committed at the County Court House at 5 1/2 o'clock to-night. Three masked men entered the office of the County Treasurer, M. Wells Bridge, and after gagging and binding him went through the safe and vaults.

At this time the amount taken cannot be estimated. Five or six hundred dollars in bills are thought to have been secured. The little value compared with the thousands of dollars in checks and valuable papers belonging to the County Treasurer, M. Wells Bridge, City Marshal Hamilton was at once notified of the robbery, and the police have been put on the case.
