

BUTLER IN UNION SQUARE. A GREAT OUTFITTING TO GREET THE PEOPLE'S LEADER.

Merchants and Women Cavalier and Cheer... Butler in Union Square... A great outfitting to greet the people's leader.

Major-Gen. Benjamin F. Butler of Massachusetts, the candidate of the People's party for the Presidency, received a rousing welcome from the voters of New York last night at an immense gathering which packed the Union square plaza to density.

Three speaking stands had been erected, one near Broadway, one at the Fourth avenue end of the plaza, and a main stand in front of the cottage. All were ornamented with flags and bunting.

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Thomas Jefferson himself would have been set aside by the so-called Democrats of the Chicago Convention who had adopted a candidate for re-eligibility.

Mr. Post announced that on Thursday next Gen. Butler will speak in the Newark Opera House, and that he will also visit New York City.

When the blow of a Roman candle and rockets which lighted up the night on Gen. Butler's arrival at the middle stand had ceased, several speakers took the stand.

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UPHEAVAL IN LOUISIANA. The Next Delegation in Congress to Stand Nearly Unanimous for Protection.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 15.—The work of nominating Congressmen in this State is nearly completed. There has been a general upheaval, and a nearly entirely new delegation will be sent to Washington, this change being due to the tariff.

In the Second district, represented at present by E. John Ellis, whose renomination was rendered impossible on account of his tariff views, W. T. Houston, a strong protectionist, was nominated.

In the Third district, E. J. Gay, the highest sugar grower in the State, was nominated, although he is a tariff reformer.
