

ANNULING THE BIG FRAUD.

THE BROADWAY RAILROAD BILLS PASS THE ASSEMBLY.

The Purchase of the Aldermen Reheated by a Vote of 100 to 90. The Assembly met at 10 o'clock.

ALBANY, April 21.—This is a red ribbon day in Albany. The everlasting Broadway bills went through the Assembly and will soon be in the Governor's hands.

KEEPER LAVERTY GUILTY.

A CRUSHING VERDICT BY THE SENATE OF NEW JERSEY.

Two Charges of Immoral Practices with Minnie Schaefer Sustained—A Dramatic Scene Kept in the Senate Chamber.

THRENTON, April 21.—Tall, slender, and erect, his stern, shaven face, hollow-eyed and haggard, but with a certain grandeur of set and firm, Patrick Henry Laverty, principal keeper of the New Jersey State prison, 56 years old, 32 years married, with wife and children living, ex-Sheriff and honored resident of Hudson county, conspicuous in his church, and a political leader in the State, stood to-day before the Senate.

Judge Hoffman for the keeper and Laverty were charged with immoral practices with Minnie Schaefer, a woman of 17 years of age.
