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NO HOPE FOR CUIVIERUS.

HE WILL SUFFER THE DEATH PENALTY FOR KILLING FANNIE MADISON.

The Decision of the Highest Court Awaits Him—He Hears the News Without a Tremor—Story of the Mysterious Mystery.

Richmond, May 6.—The Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia to-day rendered a decision in the case of T. J. Cluiverus, convicted in this city of the murder, on March 13, 1885, of Fanny Lillian Madison. The case is known as the reservoir murder mystery. The judgment of the lower court is fully sustained, the eight bills of exception filed by the prisoner's counsel being all overruled.

Cluiverus will surely be hanged unless Executive clemency interposes. The time first fixed for his execution having long since passed by, he will have to be brought before the Hustings Court for resentencing.

Cluiverus received the news very calmly. Not a muscle of his face quivered when he read the verdict. He was identified as that of Fanny Lillian Madison of King William county, and circumstances led to the fact that he was living in King and Queen county, thirty miles from Richmond.

Cluiverus lived with Mrs. Tunstall, an old maid, who was the landlady of the house where he was living. He was engaged to be married to a young woman named Fanny Lillian Madison, daughter of a farmer of King William county.

Cluiverus was arrested on the morning of March 13, 1885, while he was floating in the reservoir at 10 o'clock on the morning of March 14, 1885. There were footprints of a man and woman on the embankment. When the body was taken out, it was covered with mud. The arms were bent in front of the body, with the hands clenched and thumbs of the great fingers protruding.
