"The Radha, instead of leaking as the complainant charges, was so water tight that the fresh water in her had to be pumped out and fresh water pumped in. They say that water came through the hull, through the bottom, and through the four stowaways.

Mr. Parsons said, and also that Mr. Seymour paid his own affidavit to the effect that the Radha was leaking, and that he charged certain of his men because they refused to give him such affidavits. Mayor Grace Plans with the Conditions Imposed by the Aldermen.

The Mayor assigns as his reason for the veto that a proposed road in the North and East River would be more than 1,000 feet with the West Avenue and Bleeker Street line more than 1,000 feet on Fulton street, and therefore objectionable to the objections raised by him in the case of the "Twenty-first Street and East River Railroad."
