

HAHN CALLED HUSSEY OUT.

HE DREW HIS PISTOL IN THE SALOON AND WAITED IN THE STREET.

Philip Loughlin Tells a Story that Makes a Bad Case for the Policeman—Hahn Sent Back to the Tomb—His First Self-Defense.

Capt. Jack Hussey's widow, daughter, and son were in the coroner's office yesterday when Policeman Hahn, who shot the witness, was brought in. Besides the witness, there were very few present, because it was not generally known that Coroner Edman had set down yesterday for the inquest Mr. William How represented the prisoner.

The first witness was Policeman John Dugan. He was in Jackson street on the night of June 27, and he heard a pistol shot. He ran toward Monroe street and saw Policeman Hahn running from Capt. Hussey, who was pursuing him. Then Hahn turned and fired again.

"I was close to Hussey at the time," the witness continued, "and he turned and struck me in the face. 'Take him to the hospital,' Hahn said, 'and you had better get a good deal of trouble and coaxing and threatening I succeeded in getting him to the hospital.'
