COURTY MURDER REVEALS.

George B. Jordan Indicted for Killing Mrs. M. in his Neighbor's House.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Oct. 14.—The mystery attending the tragedy in the neighboring town of Middleburg, Conn., is now a solved. The patch murder, at length seems to be in a fair way of solution. The case has been investigated by the Grand Jury of Otsego county at its recent session, and an indictment found charging George B. Jordan with willful murder, and accordingly he has been arrested and held in jail at Cooperstown without bail to await trial.

The victim of the crime was Jerome B. Ingalls, a reputable, jovial, and inoffensive person, so far as is known without an enemy in the world. He was formerly a somewhat noted proprietor of stage lines, with headquarters at Franklin, but of late driven out of business by new railroads, had been stopping at "The Key" Hotel, Middleburg. On the evening of Sept. 24 a number of persons at the hotel, among whom were the late Mrs. M. and her family, were gathered about a table in the dining room, and a heavy load of buck-shot passing through his right arm just below the elbow lodged in the lungs, and he died almost instantly. The assassin was not recognized, but he was followed up in the street, and three days later of lockjaw.
