We cannot refuse a place to the searching but fair and impartial examination of Mr. Cleveland's career since he became President, which is published in another part of this paper, with the signature of Mr. JOSEPH O'CONNOR, one of the ablest journalists and most independent and faithful thinkers in the State of New York.

We shall not attempt by any forced suggestions of our own to increase the force and weight of this powerful and pregnant analysis. The machine which Mr. CLEVELAND now wields with such want of delicacy, such relentless contempt for consequences, and such entire disregard of every consideration except those of his own personal ambition, may dictate and compel the obedience of thousands of politicians, but it cannot control the votes of the independent Democratic masses.

The Democrats of the House held a caucus on Saturday evening to consider some of the proposed amendments to the MILLS bill. The solemn injunction of secrecy imposed upon the members present did not prevent the country from knowing early yesterday morning that the MILLS bill had suffered serious damage.

Many articles were taken from the free list which Mr. MILLS had with such infinite pains constructed, and were restored to the schedules of dutiable goods. Democrats with home interests at stake who could get no hearing from the Committee on Ways and Means while the bill was in preparation received prompt satisfaction at the hands of the caucus. The reform of Mr. MILLS's bill will be continued to-night.

It must be very astonishing to Mr. MILLS, and very exasperating to his overtaxed nerves, to find that so many Democratic Congressmen who are free traders on general principles are ardent protectionists when it comes to reforming those parts of the tariff which directly and peculiarly concern themselves and their constituents.

MR. RANDALL did not attend the caucus on Saturday night. He was not in Washington. Had he been present he would have observed that most of the changes adopted by the caucus would have been unnecessary had the RANDALL bill, instead of the MILLS bill, been under consideration.

In fact, it will not require many more nights' work of such trifling reform as was accomplished by the caucus of Saturday to make the schedules of the amended and reformed MILLS bill correspond very closely to those of the bill which the Hon. SAMUEL J. RANDALL introduced in the House on March 12, the memorable day of the great North American bizzard.

The New Jersey Local Option Law Probably Unconstitutional.

The Supreme Court of Michigan has just rendered a unanimous opinion declaring that the Michigan local option law by counties, which went into effect on the first day of the present month, is unconstitutional.

All of the Judges concur in setting aside this statute on account of certain important defects in its form. The principal defect on which the Court's opinion is based is very clear when pointed out, and may be stated in a few words.

The title of the local option law for local option by counties is, "An Act to regulate the manufacture and sale of liquor." This is not at all what the law is for. Its object is to prohibit the sale or manufacture of liquors in any county at the option of the electors. That object not being expressed in the title, the law is therefore in direct violation of Article IV, Section 2, of the State Constitution, which prescribes as follows:

"No law shall embrace more than one object, which shall be expressed in its title." While this vital objection fully disposes of the law as it now stands, our State Statute Book the Court goes on to point out other serious defects which might be enough to invalidate the measure, independently of the main objection.

The law makes inadequate provision for the calling of the special liquor elections in the counties by the County Clerk upon petition. It makes no provision for preserving the petition upon which the election is called. It does not provide for furnishing ballot boxes, nor specify when the polls shall open and close, nor require that the election shall be conducted in accordance with any existing law of the State.

It falls altogether to provide for canvassing the votes cast, and leaves the result open to vexatious litigation and uncertainty. This important decision of the Michigan Supreme Court is of special interest to people in the State just across the Hudson River. The New Jersey Legislature also passed a local option law by counties, with a measure for the regulation of the liquor traffic. That bill was vetoed by Governor GREEN on Feb. 28, and immediately passed over his veto. Like the Michigan local option law, it went into effect on May 1, but its constitutionality has not yet been tested by the Supreme Court.

Governor GREEN based his veto upon the unconstitutionality of the New Jersey law, but the points he raised were not those touched upon by the Michigan decision. We believe that we call attention for the first time to the fact that the same vital defect which renders the Michigan local option law unconstitutional and void, in the opinion of the Supreme Court of that State, exists also in the New Jersey act of March 7, 1888.

There is a provision in the New Jersey Constitution similar to that which we have quoted from the Michigan Constitution. Article IV, Section 7, provides as follows in its fourth paragraph: "To avoid improper influences which may result from interfering in one and the same act such things as have no proper relation to each other, every law shall embrace but one object, and that shall be expressed in its title."

Michigan case, and the object of the local option part of the hybrid measure is certainly not expressed in the title. There is more than one object, and the title is not a conclusive index to the legislative intent. Unlike the Michigan statute that is now void by decision of the Supreme Court, the New Jersey law does contain a provision that the county liquor elections shall be conducted in accordance with the general election laws of the State. But here again we encounter a constitutional defect hardly less serious than that just stated. Section 5 of the New Jersey law says:

"All such elections (county local option) shall be held under the same regulations as are now or may be prescribed for holding the general elections for members of the General Assembly and Senate; and all penalties contained in the said general election laws of this State are hereby extended to and made applicable to the special elections provided for in this act."

Thus, the general provisions of an existing law are made applicable in the case of the special elections provided for by the act. But there is an amendment to the New Jersey Constitution, ratified in 1875, which distinctly says:

"No act shall be passed which shall provide that any existing law, or any part thereof, shall be made or deemed a part of the act, or which shall exact that any existing law, or any part thereof, shall be exact, except by inserting in such act."

The high license and local option act of New Jersey does enact that the existing general election law shall be applicable, and it fails to insert the existing law in the act. We commend to the Constitutional lawyers over the river a careful study of the Michigan decision. It looks very much as if the high license and local option bill, passed at Trenton last winter for political effect, was so loosely constructed that it would not be difficult to drive a coach and four, or even a Newark brewery wagon, through some of its yawning gaps.

Hubert's Plan of Campaign.

There is something very pathetic about the case of a lad who was arrested at Newark last Tuesday.

It seems that his father is a drunkard who has impoverished his family by squandering his money in rum shops. Therefore the son and another lad, whose father and grandfather are both drunkards likewise, have vowed to devote their lives to the extermination of the liquor traffic. In the pursuit of this purpose on Sunday night they tore from a saloon keeper's window the metallic letters of his sign, and hid them away. Their intention had been to go further, and "turn on the faucets of all the rum and beer barrels in the place and let the vile stuff run away;" but they were unable to get into the saloon.

The lad who was arrested is named HUBERT, and he made no effort to escape, though the other boy seems to have fled in terror when the policeman appeared. HUBERT stood his ground boldly, and did not hesitate to acknowledge his guilt, for he had been inspired by what he regarded as a holy motive, superior to the statutes of New Jersey; but while he was telling his story the poor boy burst into tears, though he did not flinch in his determination to spend his life in warfare against the rum traffic. It is gratifying to know that he was released on bail, and probably he has had all the punishment which he will receive for his offence.

Now, the plan of campaign against drink adopted by these lads is not much more unreasoned and unphilosophical than the liquor laws of this State. Under those laws every saloon keeper in town is liable to arrest if he exposes intoxicating liquor for sale on Sunday, and accordingly the police are now making such arrests at the rate of 5,000 a year. In the different precincts certain policemen are sent out on Sunday in citizen's dress to pick up offending saloon keepers, as if the law was rigorously enforced, though they know, and everybody else knows, that the saloons generally are open for business on that day. Instead, therefore, of arresting only 75 or 100 of the keepers, they would run in thousands of them every Sunday if they captured all who were conducting the unlawful traffic.

We do not say this in disparagement of the police, for it would be practically impossible for them to make so many thousands of arrests every Sunday. The public sentiment, however, would sustain them in doing it. The saloons are open on Sunday in defiance of the law because that public sentiment is stronger than the law, as the determination of the lad HUBERT was stronger than his respect for the statutes of New Jersey. The law which he broke in one way at Newark last Sunday was openly defied and contemptuously disregarded in another way by thousands of men in New York; and so it is on every Sunday throughout the year.

More than that, even the small number of men arrested proportionately to the whole number of law breakers are generally allowed to go unpunished. Like HUBERT, they are released on bail, and if they are indicted by the Grand Jury, before which only a few of their cases are ever brought, they are either not tried or the petit jury dismisses a great part of them. The number of cases which come in the District Attorney's office already reaches many thousands, and they are steadily multiplying, with little chance that more than a small fraction of them will ever be brought to trial; and mean time Sunday liquor selling goes on with almost as much freedom as if there were no law against it. There is, of course, a pretence of closing the saloons, but their side doors are open, and nobody, not suspected of being a policeman, finds much difficulty in getting in.

Therefore we say that the State of New York is as Quixotic as this Newark boy in its methods of attacking the liquor traffic, and it reaches a result which is not less farcical, though as vast and powerful community it does infinitely more to weaken the popular respect for all law.

New Sources of Iron and Copper.

Last year Mr. DUPONT, director of the Museum of Natural History at Brussels, went to the Congo for the purpose of studying the geology of the valley from the Atlantic to the confuence of the Kasai River, over 400 miles from the coast. After eight months devoted to this work, he has returned to Europe, bringing some surprising reports with regard to the mineral resources of the region. He says that throughout the entire extent of the country he found in the plateau skirting the river, under the thick alluvium, a stratum of iron ore from a foot and a half to three feet in thickness. In numerous places he saw blocks of iron ore sometimes many cubic feet in dimensions upon the slopes of ravines, where they had been exposed by denudation. He asserts that there is scarcely a country in the world so rich in iron ore as the Congo basin, and the mineral is not only abundant, but can also be easily worked. In his opinion, if the other continents were exhausted of iron, the Congo basin can supply the rest of the world for a long period.

Mr. DUPONT says that it is the large quantity of ferruginous matter in the water of the Congo that give them their ochre tint. This sediment is deposited along the river bottom, and by infiltration it is slowly accumulating below the alluvial deposits. In this way beds of iron ore are now forming below the Congo's current, and it was through this same process, Mr. DUPONT asserts, that the extensive mineral beds discovered were formed at a period when inner Africa was covered with the sea, which finally burst through the mountain barrier where the Congo Rapids now impede navigation. At the Kasai's mouth the Congo is, if anything, more decidedly ochreous in color than further down, and the geologist asserts that the great sources of the mineral are still further inland.

Mr. DUPONT also found on the lower river not far from the sea great beds of blue malachite, one of the richest of copper ores. The same mineral has been found in abundance in about the same longitude in both the Portuguese and French territory, and, as far as is now known, this rich copper-bearing belt has a north and south extension of about 120 miles. The report of Mr. DUPONT is certainly calculated to encourage the men who are carrying on the work of the Congo Independent State.

Within two years past three Democrats distinguished for ability and devotion in the public service, and of the first public prominence, have each received a rebuke of great severity at the hands of their constituents. All of these accidents were before the day of Administration interference with Democratic politics, except that to Mr. BRECKINRIDGE; and in his case it was in spite of the pressure from Washington in his favor. Many Democratic Congressmen have found their nominating Conventions shut in the hand of the President, not to be released for their benefit unless upon agreement to recede to the principles and accept the bill. Some of them, Mr. SENEX of Ohio, for example, have submitted. But this carries the fortunes of such Democratic Congressmen beyond the line of ordinary danger, and must inevitably make the Democratic strength in the next Congress less than it would have been had the various constituencies been left to their accustomed independence.

The Pope's latest encyclical deals with the evils of slavery in Africa and the need of protecting and extending missionary operations on that continent. One of the latest acts of Pope Pius IX. was to cause a decree to be prepared authorizing the establishing of missions in equatorial Africa. He died before he could sign the document, and Pope Leo XIII. four days after he became the head of the Church, signed the decree which his predecessor had prepared. This eleven years ago, and it is not inoperative. If American auditors of estates and drinkables were to be banished to Alaska for life, what a multitudinous wailing and wringing of hands and sitting down and weeping by the waters of the pseudo Jones River there would be.

It is known that at least one of our city churches with a vacant pulpit has taken warning from the recent judicial decision against the Episcopal clergyman who was brought here from England, in violation of the law against the importation of foreign contract laborers. Not long ago the Church of the Covenant in Park avenue was trying to enter into an agreement with the Rev. Mr. GORRIN, a minister of the Episcopal Church in Scotland, but the decision in question has led to a change of policy in the matter, and it is now trying to obtain a man of domestic training for its pulpit. There are in this city several prominent clergymen who were brought from abroad under contract in years gone by, but who could not now enter into a like contract under the new law which forbids during the entire term of the contract, unless he is a native-born citizen, Dr. WALKER of the Church of the Holy Trinity.

While the Knights of Labor are dwindling in numbers and their assemblies are breaking up here and everywhere else, the old trades unions are enlarging their membership and strengthening their lines all over the country. The Presbyterian Church in the United States is celebrating its first centennial, vast preparations are being made in Russia, under the authority of the Czar, for the celebration next year of the centennial of the birth of the Church in his empire. The organ of the grandest pomp and chief ceremonies will be in the ancient city of Kiev, the capital of Christianized Russia, and in the magnificent old cathedral of St. Sophia, near which stand the palace of the Greek Metropolitan and the Peterhofskoye. It was in the year 1862 that Alexander, Great, Emperor of Russia, was baptized, and it was on Christy that he ordered the introduction of Christianity into the entire empire, which had been mainly pagan. The imperial dignitaries, the army, the nobility, the ecclesiastics, and other officials will take part in the great celebration for which preparations are being made. In view of the fact that the Czar recently expressed the hope that this might be a year of peace for his empire.
