NEW RULES FOR THE TURF. THE CONGRESS OF WESTERN MEN AC-COMPLISHES ITS WORK.

No Contracts to be Made with Bookmakers. A resolution was adopted by the Western racing men which annual meeting of the American Turf Congress was held in New York, and that is the cooperation of the great racing associations here to carry out what they consider needed reforms of the turf and a uniformity of racing rules.

The first conference of importance yesterday took place at the Coney Island Jockey Club's rooms between the Turf Congress Committee and that of the local clubs. The meeting was organized by the appointment of Col. M. Lewis Clark of Louisville, Chairman, and J. G. K. Lawrence of the Coney Island Jockey Club, Secretary.

A slight change was made in the adoption of the new rules. Mr. Dwyer has agreed to on Thursday. A resolution was passed to be submitted to the congress, that in all races exclusively for two-year-olds the weight shall be 118 pounds, and in all races for three-year-olds exclusively the weight shall be 125 pounds.

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
