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No Bulldozing!

It seems to be the general opinion among Republican journals and politicians that President Harrison will call the Fifty-first Congress to meet in October. The apparent Republican majority in the House of Representatives is exceedingly small. It is important for the Republicans to organize that body and increase their majority by the familiar process of unseating Democrats from contested districts. They also desire to change the rules of the House so that the power of the minority to obstruct hateful schemes can be abolished. The ostensible purpose of the called session will doubtless be to agree upon the future Republican policy in regard to the tariff; but the real purpose is to devise means of putting the minority down.

Mr. RANDALL has already declared in strong words his resolve to fight to the last attempts unduly to restrict or curtail the rights of the minority. Under his skillful and courageous leadership the Democrats will not meet in October, and the House should present a united front which the Republicans will find it difficult to break through.

The contest will be welcomed by the Democracy and is likely to be beneficial to that party. The discipline and stimulus of opposition will cause recent disagreements and differences to disappear, for the time at least, and both Protectionists and Free Traders will stand together in defense of the rights of both.

England and the French Republic.

How the royal family and present Tory Government of England regard republican institutions has been unmistakably revealed by two recent incidents. Lord LYTONS, the English ambassador to the Elysee, took no part in the commemoration of the opening of the States-General, and neither Queen VICTORIA nor any of her children has visited the Paris Exposition. On the other hand, the Prince and Princess of Wales, their three daughters, the Princess CHRISTINA, the Duchess of EDINBURGH, and the Duchess of ALBANY joined in celebrating the silver wedding of the Comte and Comtesse de PARIS on Thursday at Sheen House. Against these marks of sympathy with political reaction may be set the fact that every Gladstonian and Parnellite member of Parliament has signed a letter to President CARNOT expressing regret that his country's official representative should not have paid due honor to the French national anniversary.

It would be scarcely possible for the British Government to remain so clearly in the rear that the present political régime of France might be subverted and succeeded by a monarchical system. Thirty-seven years ago Lord PALMERSTON was driven from office for an avowal of satisfaction at the triumph of reaction in the person of LOUIS NAPOLEON, over the second French Republic. Lord DEXBY and Mr. DISRAELI, the leaders of the Tory party at that time, were vehement and seemingly sincere in their declarations of amazement that any Englishman could view without sorrow the overthrow of free institutions in a neighboring country. Herein they followed the creditable example set by another Tory Prime Minister, GEORGE CANNING, who, in spite of the principles asserted by the Holy Alliance, assisted in many ways the struggle of the Spanish-American colonies for independence.

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A Gorgeous Feast in China. The members of the foreign diplomatic corps at Peking have recently been entertained by the Ministry of the Chinese Government at a magnificent banquet given to celebrate the marriage of the young Emperor and his accession to the throne. In accordance with the custom which prevails in China on such ceremonial occasions, a number of presents were provided. These comprised a wooden sceptre inlaid with jade, a piece of silk, and a tobacco pipe for each foreign Minister who was present.

Poverty a Disease.

Mr. AMOS G. WARNER contributes a very interesting and somewhat novel paper to the public by the American Statistical Association. It is a statistical examination into the causes of poverty. He takes five collections of figures, gleaned from the study of as many different bodies of people to whom public charitable aid has been extended. They are the 28,257 individuals receiving public relief in Prussia, the entire population of East London, numbering about 1,000,000 souls, among whom Mr. CHARLES BOOTH has labored with great assiduity, the 37,970 cases which have been investigated by our Charity Organization societies, and 6,197 cases relieved by the public or private charitable agencies in the town of Buffalo.
