

KILLED BY HIS LANDLORD.

LATHEE J. M. WALLACH'S FATAL SCOTCH WITH FREDERICK HOPP.

Mrs. Wallach and Mr. Hopp have been arrested at their residence at 437 East 11th street, New York, on the charge of the murder of Frederick Hopp, a well-to-do real estate dealer, in a quarrel which began between them in Hopp's residence, 437 East 11th street, nearly a week ago.

Mr. Wallach was 37 years of age, and was born in Hartford, Conn. His father is Henry Wallach, formerly a senior member of the firm of Wallach & Sons, wholesale dealers in shirts, of 38 Thomas street, but several years ago Mr. Wallach retired from business with a large fortune, and he now lives at Manhattan.

Hopp was Wallach's landlord at 437 East 11th street for a number of years. He had been in the front room, standing back from the street, and with a grass plot and flower bed in front. Frederick Hopp appears on a German silver plate on the front door. Mr. Hopp had a large family, and Mrs. Wallach and her husband occupied the entire second floor. Mrs. Hopp and Mrs. Wallach had been on friendly terms, and it does not appear that there was any open quarrel between the families until last week.

Mr. Joseph Morley moved an amendment declaring that "the House is unwilling to increase the burdens of the people without assurance that no further claims will be made for younger members of the royal family."

The Government had not made out their case either in the select committee or in the House. Parliament had already liberally provided for all the children of the Queen. It had not been shown that retrogressive grants might be made in expenditures upon royalty without causing the Queen any anxiety.
