

RICHES IN CALIFORNIA THAT THE FORTY-NINERS OVERLOOKED.

Better Chances for Good Prospects than Ever—A New Machine to Crush Ore—Finds Results of Idaho Cleanups—Hunting for Gold at Glencaster, H.M. Goodrich.

San Francisco, June 9.—The Confidence mine on Iron Mountain, Elmore county, Idaho, has been discovered as "a vast tract filled with silver and gold ore." The fact that last month's run produced a two-horse wagon load of silver bullion, weighing 2,500 pounds, indicates that the Courier's estimate of the wealth of Iron Mountain is not greatly exaggerated.

Who are working the placers of Ensenada, Lower California, are said to be making big wages. A flume has been built, and a hydraulic ram will be in operation soon.

Major Zimelman has a ten-stamp mill running on the Elmore mine, and his first haul was worth \$10,000. He has taken out \$15,000 more than the entire cost of his plant, and says there is over \$50,000 worth of ore in sight.

Big Strike Near Newark. It is reported that a big strike has been made in the Providence mine in Newark, N. J. The mine was abandoned after it was exhausted, and after running for a few years.
