

FRED DOUGLASS AT HOME.

HE OBTAINED SIXTY DAYS LEAVE FROM HIS POST IN HAYTI.

Despite the Oppressive Heat of August and September, Mr. Douglass has been in the city for the past few days, and is expected to remain here for some time.

Washington, July 26.—"Six days by water and as many hours by land," said the Hon. Frederick Douglass, United States Minister to Hayti, in his report this morning.

"I secured a sixty days' leave from the State Department," said the Haytian Minister in explanation of the long absence.

"I may still look strong, but time is telling on me, and the ten months in Hayti has made my steps less firm. I enjoyed another birthday while away, being now past my sixtieth year."

"I am glad to see you, and I can hardly imagine the possibilities of that land under the hands of thirty Americans."

"The climate is not so bad as it is reported to be, and almost without the effort of man these conditions invite to leisure, even to indolence, and possibly our own people could not resist such seductive charms."

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UNBAY ON BOTH SIDES.

The Patching Up of the Clockmakers' Strike Said to be a Hollow Truce.

There seems to be a general impression on both sides that the clockmakers' strike will break out again. It probably arises from speculation about what may naturally be expected from the humiliation of the manufacturer and the exultation of the employees.

Manufacturers Frank Lotzscheld, Jr. and several others have hinted that as soon as the season's work is done the operators will have to pay for their victory, according to the agreement which was made at the union between the date of the signing of the agreement and the date of the expiration of the same.

The Manufacturers' Association will meet to-morrow and will probably make some suggestion to the effect of a general strike.

"If you will keep your eyes open you will see trouble in three or four days. The present truce is only a truce, and somebody will jump it just as sure as you live."

The clockmakers are not letting grass grow under their feet either. They are working as hard as they can to get their work done as fast as they can.

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THE GOSSOON'S YACHT.

A Fine Fast Cutter Yacht for a Cruise on Race Designed by Burgess.

BOSTON, July 25.—The Gosssoon, the new queen of the forty-footers, whose victory over the fleet Minerva has placed her so prominently before yachtsmen, is one of the prettiest yachts afloat, and Mr. Burgess, her designer, as well as the Messrs. George C. and Charles F. Adams, 2d, her owners, are mighty proud of her.

The Gosssoon is a cutter designed both for racing and cruising. Her water line is 32 feet 7 inches, and on deck she measures 51 feet. She draws 3 feet, her extreme beam is 11 feet 7 inches, and her racing measurement is 45 feet.

In her construction she is composite, every third frame being of steel. The planking is of hard pine and her hull is painted white. At first her bottom was bronzed, but she is now painted out of the water and copper plated.
