

LIVE WASHINGTON TOPICS.

BOYH NOUVE OF CONGRESS MEET AND ADJOURN UNTIL MONDAY.

A Bill introduced in the House to Revoke Practical Currency Notes—Interstate Commerce Cases Before the Supreme Court—Republican Senators Consent About the Gap Rate.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Although it was understood when the Senate adjourned last night that the session to-day would be merely formal, there were four important items on the agenda, including Mr. Allison, who had been absent from the city for ten days.

There was no quorum in the House, and after the introduction of the following resolutions the House adjourned until Monday.

Some quiet consultation has been in progress among the Republican Senators now in the city with reference to the next week's proceedings.

It is understood that Judge Brown of Detroit will be here when the United States Supreme Court meets on Monday next.

The Secretary of the Treasury to-day appointed A. L. Drummond of New York to be chief of the special division of the Treasury.

Chief Justice Bingham, in the Criminal Court to-day, made an order certifying the case of C. A. Newton, indicted in September last for violating the Civil Service law.

At a meeting of the officers and clerks of the United States Treasury office held this evening, an order was issued by the Treasurer, Mr. Drummond, who had experience in this branch of the service, having served in it continuously from 1871 to 1886.

The Secretary of the Navy has accepted the eight-inch gun carriage built by the Army Ordnance Company, which was recently ordered at Annapolis, before a Board of Naval Officers consisting of Capt. E. O. Matteson, Commander in Chief of the Navy, and Mr. G. H. B. Smith, Chief of Ordnance.

REILLY STARTLES THE BOYS.

THE COMMISSIONER OF JURORS GOING TO LEAVE TAMMANY.

His intention to discover of October After He Had Turned Four Tammany Men Out—He Won't Tell What's the Matter.

The first stir of the year in local politics was made yesterday by Charles Reilly, Commissioner of Jurors, who turned four Tammany men out of office before he had got his seat in the vicar's comfortable warm.

Mr. Reilly left the ranks of the County Democracy before the campaign of 1899, and began to bustle in the interests of Tammany with all the vigor of a recruit.

He was welcomed into the Tammany fold by Edward T. Fitzpatrick, the Tammany leader in the County Democracy.

Yesterday he was summarily dismissed from office by Deputy Commissioner James E. Connor of the Third district.

Mr. Connor was deputy Commissioner nearly six years, in his place Mr. Reilly applied for the office of Commissioner of Jurors.
