

BLOW TO THE FORCE BILL.

REPUBLICANS IN THE SENATE CAUGHT NAPPING.

The Bill Taken Up and Mr. George's Time-keeping Speech Resumed Just When Mr. Aldrich Thought He Could Get His Clo-

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The Senate will meet to-morrow morning, confronted by a very confused state of affairs, and one which really holds out little hope to Mr. Reed and the other radical advocates of the Force bill.

After a crushing and unexecuted defeat today the Republicans rallied and regained some of their lost ground, but only by an arrangement with the Democrats. Senator Aldrich now has the floor on the motion to adopt a closure rule, and Mr. George still has the floor on the Force bill.

Before either proposition is considered a fight must take place over the question whether the proposed closure rule is properly before the Senate or not. Senator Aldrich technically secured the floor before adjournment.

It is necessary to recall that the motion of Senator Gorman, the Democratic manager, and Senator George, who was not compelled to yield the floor, but did so because he thought there was little to be gained by so doing.

The Democrats still have a dozen frons in the. They have succeeded in so badly compelling the situation that the attempt to pass must first be cleared by debate upon several disputed points before the question upon the adoption of the closure rule or the passage of the Force bill can be put.

The Democrats will prevent a vote on either question if possible, but if they cannot do this they will insist upon the adoption of the closure rule. There are more Republican Senators opposed to the rule than to the Force bill, and the chances are more largely in favor of its defeat.

Both sides realize that the next few days will see the end of the battle, and that the events of to-morrow may forestall the result.

Mr. George's speech, notwithstanding their present bluster, are beginning to weaken, and it is quite probable that within the next day or two, unless the bill be passed or defeated, some plan will be arranged by which they can more or less gracefully retreat from the battlefield, leaving the Democrats victorious.

The exceedingly clever bit of parliamentary strategy by which the Democrats upset Mr. Aldrich early in to-day's proceedings was very different from Mr. Hoar and his followers, several of whom are now discussing the wisdom of throwing up the sponge.

It is remarkable that Senators Hoar, Aldrich, Edmunds, and Spooner and the other Republicans, who are well versed in parliamentary rules and practice, should have been caught napping as they were. Mr. Aldrich is a very shrewd man, and generally a very successful fighter, but he was beaten this morning.

It is not surprising that Mr. Aldrich should have been so badly beaten, for he was not only out of his element, but he was also out of his wits. He was so much surprised and so much embarrassed that he did not know what to do.
