

DEPLETING THE TREASURY.

Indians who become carpenters, blacksmiths, or are adepts in any other mechanical trade taught by the Government, can secure no work at the agency, and are not allowed to look for work elsewhere. If a schoolhouse or other Government building is erected at an Indian agency, white mechanics are imported in preference to red men upon the job.
