THE NEW CONSTITUTION.

Many Radical Changes Made—It Will Be Voted Upon in August.

LOUISVILLE, April 11.—The Kentucky Constitutional Convention to-day completed the constitution, after being in session 124 days.

The preamble to the new constitution provides that no grant of exclusive privileges shall be made except for public service; that no property shall be exempt from the taxation except as provided in the constitution; that every franchise shall be subject to amendment and revocation.
