The trial of the suit of Father Francis Dent against Bishop Ryan of Buffalo, for \$100,000 damages for alleged slander, was continued yesterday in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn.

Father Dent had been on the witness stand at the call of the defense for a few hours before the close of the session on Wednesday, and was again there for an hour yesterday.

THE BURNING SILVER MINE.

A Hundred Bodies Found and 800 More Are in the Pit.

VENONA, June 2.—One hundred bodies have been recovered from a mine at Fratt. It is believed that not less than 200 bodies are still in the mine, and there is no hope that even one is alive.

As each body was delivered on the surface there was a rush to identify and the police had to work under directions not to use any force.

More than 125 are still unclaimed, as the disfigurement of the bodies has rendered most of the relatives unable to identify them.

It is estimated that more than 200 families, representing almost 1,000 of the population, have been affected by the disaster.
