

AMERY BAD DAY FOR DAILEY

DAMAGING TESTIMONY AGAINST THE ACCUSED HOUSMAN.

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OUR BUSY CLASH GUARD

The Achievements and the Needs of the Revenue Marine.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Few branches of the executive service of the Government have more to show proportionally for their expenditures than the revenue marine.

During the last fiscal year, as Capt. Shepard's report shows, these vessels covered an aggregate of 335,512 miles, being an increase of nearly 34,000 over the year before. They boarded and examined 37,521 merchant vessels, an increase of 10,550, and 1,233 of these were found to have violated the law in some way, while the fines and penalties incurred amounted to \$247,445.

The extent of this service, considered geographically and otherwise, is remarkable. Far north in Behring Sea, the Corwin, the Rush, and the Albatross, were engaged in the summer of the year, and the most important seizure of the summer, that of the Coquitlan, was made by the revenue marine, as also were the seizures of the British schooners Henrietta and Winnifred and the American bark Lydia.

As is well known, efforts have been made in the present Congress, as in the preceding, to put the revenue marine on an equality with the navy in certain respects where it is now at a disadvantage. At present it has no retired list for its officers and men, and no longevity pay, while a system of deductions for absence prior to that of navy officers is at least inferior to that of the navy.

The record of the year's work will form a most interesting and profitable study for those who are interested in the progress of the revenue marine. The revenue marine is a body of men who are engaged in the most important and dangerous work of the Government.

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FOR THE ANNEXATION OF CANADA

Platform of the Canadian Advocates of Continental Union.

The movement for the union of Canada and the United States is gradually and steadily progressing. The Canadian advocates of this cause have formulated a platform which is embodied in the following pronouncement, issued by the Continental Union Association for circulation throughout the Dominion:

1. The Federal or National Government for the whole of North America, the same to consist of a Senate and House of Representatives, representation in the House to be according to population, the number of members to be one member for every 200,000, thus giving Canada 20 members, and the entire Union about 350.

2. For the purpose of the Union, Canada to be divided into eight Provinces or States, each of which shall be entitled to elect two members to the Senate, and the same proportion as the American States of the Union.

3. The System of Government to be Federal in character, such as now prevailing in Canada, but to be also strictly Republican, thereby insuring the election by the people of all Provincial Governors or rulers. No title of nobility to be granted either by the national, Provincial, or State Legislatures, or by any office holding office of profit or trust under them, to be prohibited from accepting any present, emolument, honor, or title of any kind whatever from any king, prince, or foreign State.

4. The national Government to be prohibited from establishing any religion, or from interfering with the free exercise of the rights of conscience, commerce, foreign and domestic, property, copyright, patents, and trademarks, or from imposing any tax for the purpose of the Union, and for the general support of the Government.




