LORD SALISBURY IN IRELAND.

He Denounces Irish Home Rule in His Speech, Vigorous Style.

BELFAST, May 23.—Lord Salisbury was received with great enthusiasm to-day at Larnie by the opponents of Irish home rule. His lordship was loudly cheered upon his arrival, and he saluted with a discharge of seventeen guns.

Lord Salisbury, in responding to a Unionist address there, said that if Great Britain should be hostile to Ireland, or should even entertain the kind of friendship manifested by Sweden toward Norway—Mr. Gladstone's favorite illustration of the advantages of home rule—the sources of prosperity in Ireland would be dried up and the industries of Ulster would decay.
