

BIG TOM BRENNAN RESIGNS.

EXCISE COMMISSIONER ANDREW MADE STREET CLEANER.

Col. M. C. Murphy Gets the Excise Commission—Mr. Andrews Will Go to Work Tomorrow on the Street Cleaning Commission.

New York City has a new street cleaning commissioner in the person of William S. Andrews, who resigned as Excise Commissioner yesterday, and was appointed to succeed Thomas S. Brennan.

Commissioner Brennan resigned with Mayor Gilroy last Monday, but it was not until yesterday afternoon that the resignation was sworn in and will go to work this morning.

In his letter of resignation Commissioner Brennan refers to the illness in which he and his wife were afflicted last year.

The necessity of leaving the city with his sick son, which he did on Thursday, and Mayor Gilroy mentioned no other reason for the action taken. It was well known, though, that Commissioner Brennan had been long dissatisfied with his place, and that it was his purpose to retire early last spring had not the City Club reformers made their attack on him for alleged inefficiency.

Commissioner Andrews will have the difficult task of reorganizing the department so as to do the work required under the reduced appropriations.

The new Commissioner has never had any experience as street cleaning commissioner, but is considered a man of much executive ability.

The salary of the Street Cleaning Commissioner is \$10,000 a year, and that of an Excise Commissioner \$5,000.
